
#### **BRAM**





It is also important for exhibitors, whether handlers or owner/handlers, to mentor new handlers for the future of dog shows.

Kathy Hufnagle brought her puppy, Clover, to our Specialty, so she could experience the sights and sounds of a dog show. She also brought Makayla, who is planning on showing Clover as a junior handler.

#### **Junior Showmanship**

The American Kennel Club: Junior Showmanship Pamphlet - July 1, 2016

The AKC offers youngsters 9 to 18 years of age the opportunity to compete with others their own age at various AKC events. Juniors competing in conformation events are judged on how they present their dogs.

Juniors are important to the sport of dogs. Juniors who learn about good sportsmanship, dogs, handling and dog shows will be valuable to the sport in the future. Junior Showmanship classes are held so that young people can:

- Experience winning and losing among those who are similar in age.
- Learn the correct way to handle the breed they own.
- Practice handling skills in competition
- Improve the way they handle their own dog.
- Prepare for handling dogs in the regular classes.

In classes, junior handlers are judged on the ability to handle his or her dog. The quality of the dog is not judged. Juniors will be asked to demonstrate:

- Moving the dog with the rest of the class.
- Presenting the dog in the standing position proper to its breed (including the use of an examining table).
  - Moving the dog individually in a regular pattern.

Juniors should strive to make the DOG stand out as the most important part of the team effort. And, they should:

- Keep their dog's attention without using dramatic or unnecessary movements.
- Gait their dogs in a controlled trot without distracting or interfering with the judge's view of the dog. Be aware of what is going on in the ring.
  - Concentrate on their dog and not the judge.

#### CONFORMATION SHOWS: Part 2

## RIBBONS, ROSETTES, AND REGALIA - WHAT'S GOING ON IN THERE?

Some highlights of the presentation given by Richard C. Bumstead on April 22, 2018

#### A Glossary:

AKC Registration - Means that a dog, its parents and its ancestors are purebred. It does not indicate health or quality. Dogs registered with the AKC may have their offspring registered and compete in AKC events.

American-Bred - A class for dogs that were bred and whelped in America. It is a hold-over from the early days of the AKC when so many dogs were being imported. Dogs competing are not yet champions.

Bench Show - A dog show at which the dogs are kept on assigned benches when not being shown in competition, so they can be viewed and discussed by attendees, exhibitors and breeders. (The Westminster Kennel Club Dog Show is one of only a handful of benched shows in the United States.)

Major - A big win for a class dog who has defeated enough dogs that day by going Winners Dog or Winners Bitch, to earn either 3, 4, or 5 points towards its championship. The point schedule is different for each, sex, and region, depending upon the number of entries.

Special - A common term for a Champion of Record who is still being actively shown.

Steward - The person who runs the ring for the judge; Hands out the armbands and checks the dogs in for judging; Calls each class into the ring; Verifies that the correct entries for each class are in the ring for the judge; Gets the ribbons and prizes organized and ready to hand out; Keeps a parallel set of records in case there is a dispute; Keeps the ring neat and clean.

Superintendent - Licensed by the AKC to manage the shows; Publishes the premium list, takes entries, and issues the judging program; Provides all of the equipment, catalog, ribbons, and official record keeping documents.

Veteran - Dogs at least 7 years old. This non-regular class is designed to honor those dogs who have maintained their structural integrity, health, vigor and love of showing into their golden years.

#### A FINANCIAL RECAP (Draft!)

Greater financial transparency has been a goal these past months, and will continue to be a priority focus ongoing. Membership should know where every dollar is spent, and under whose authority. Committee budgets should be prepared....and adhered to, with both the budgets and any costs outside budget amounts approved by the board beforehand. Final numbers ending June 30, 2018 are still being analyzed, but here are areas of "knowns" at the time of this newsletter print date:

Trophy Fund: Beginning balance at 09/01/17 \$1,117.86; trophy donations received luncheon thru 06/30/18 \$915.00; cost of trophies for Specialty: \$300 for artwork / \$25 for shipping of artwork / \$465 expected for cash awards / \$110.00 not awarded and remains in trophy fund - total \$680.00 spent on trophies for June specialty; trophy fund balance at June 30th \$1,502.86.

Club Business Expenditures: These one-time costs to separate club from rescue included a \$31.00 fee for a copy of our Articles of Incorporation, a \$600.00 application fee to the IRS with our 501(c)(7) application, and a \$25.00 fee to the Illinois Secretary of State to file our resolution that our name is formally The Scottish Terrier Club of Chicago.

The Plaid Piper: September thru June issues cost \$250.33; Subscriptions covered \$54.00.

**Insurance Costs:** General Liability, Director and Officers, and Bonding coverages totaled \$1,309.00.

**Specialty Costs Outside Trophies:** Unknown at this time.

18/19 Membership Dues Received and Deposited as of June 30, 2018: \$960.00

Club Fund Balance Beginning of Year (08/22/17): \$4,882.14

Club Fund Balance End of Year (with all expenses accounted for): Unknown at this time.

As final receipts are reimbursed and costs allocated to the various committees and events, we will get more information out to all of membership. With our future encompassing a possible 2021 Rotating event? We need a firm accounting process in place. Guidelines, policies and procedures are a must in this area!!!

#### THE CLAN CONNECTION: STCA BAGPIPER 2018, #2 (Reprinted)

The mud of spring has arrived and so have the footprints throughout the house and on the sliding glass doors - as the critters awake from the winter, the terriers want to be back outside – game on!

The STCC has been busy working on getting numerous business items and procedures updated as we complete the separation of our Club and the Rescue operations. Various committees have been looking at the tax status, official name, insurance coverages, as well as updating the Constitution and Bylaws, seeking AKC guidance to make sure that what we are proposing fits within their governance. This work can be tedious and time consuming, but we have been trying to get our house in order under this new organization. We hope that these issues won't have to be addressed again for a long time.

At the March meeting, we had a change in speaker, as a program we wanted to host was suddenly available: the care of our senior dogs. We will all go through this with our dogs, so it was useful to have Rosemary LoGiudice DVM, join us to explain first and foremost that aging is not a disease, and therefore shouldn't be seen as such, it is a phase of life. An important take away was the concept that dogs age differently than we do – they grow up and go through the early phases of life so quickly with frequent checkups, yet we don't treat the senior dog the same way we do the puppy. A yearly exam at the vets is like one of us going to the doctor every 5-7 years – for a checkup. She also reiterated the notion that you should only buy kibble for your dogs in quantities that will be consumed in a matter of several weeks. The oils can go rancid and then the food becomes less palatable, especially to the senior dog.

Lastly, STCC is finalizing details for the June 16, 2018 specialty. The show will again sit within a five-day cluster (MAJORS!!) at the Lake County Fairgrounds in Grayslake, Illinois. Judges are: Sweeps – Jacki Forkel; Classes - William Potter. Premium lists should be mailed shortly, and we have confirmation that there will be reserved grooming available for the entire cluster from Wednesday June 13<sup>th</sup> through the 17<sup>th</sup> - forms will be sent with the premium lists. #### The Scottish Terrier Club of Chicago

The Scottish Terrier Club of Chicago was founded in 1930 by T.E. Weible and Mrs. M.F. Hills. On September 17, 1979, we were formally incorporated as a Not For Profit in the State of Illinois.

Our club is the 2nd oldest Scottish Terrier club in the nation. (California being the oldest club.) It is interesting to note that in 1959 there were still only eleven regional clubs. However, today, STCC is proud to be one of twenty Scottish Terrier regional clubs recognized by the Scottish Terrier Club of America.

STCC held its first Specialty show in November, 1930. Today, our Specialty shows are held annually the third Saturday of June at the Lake County Fairgrounds in Grayslake, IL.

Across the years our club has changed leadership and direction, as has every regional club. The allure of the Scottish Terrier has decreased, and nationally there is a strong conversation as to how to rebuild the breed, and our clubs. At our height we had 80 members. Although our membership declined, our current initiative is to expand our clubs footprint, and we are reaching out full force to add new members and, thus new energy and ideas. Today we boast 57 members and counting.

Most of our tenured members have served this club in a leadership capacity - at least once. And, there is a strong knowledge base across our club, focused on our mission. Breeders, exhibitors, and those with companion Scotties have come together with determination to improve the lives and futures of our Scotties.

In recent years, successes have been made for our breed. A test is available for Cushings Syndrome through Dr. Zimmerman and UTenn. Studies at Purdue University focused on learning more about bladder cancer. And, there is now a home kit available to test for this awful diagnosis, made possible by Dr. Breen.
