# STCC NEW LITTER!! Makayla's Scottie Clover and her puppies (July 10/11, 2020)



This was my first experience delivering puppies, and it was my beautiful Clover, who is my heart dog. I have been excited and anxious throughout her entire pregnancy. I love the idea of having puppies and I really want to keep a male dog to show.

The process of breeding is crazy. Cindy Cooke looked over Clover and decided that her dog Titan would be a good match for her. When she came into heat, three progesterone tests were run. The last one was high which told us she had to be bred that day... I mean immediately! Kathy and I raced to Kalamazoo for Clover to be bred to Titan.

After that it was a waiting game, we were anxious to hear if we made it in time for breeding to be successful. It was - the pregnancy test was positive! Clover just kept getting bigger and bigger as her babies were growing in her tummy. X-rays were taken a few days before she was due and Kathy counted six little spines.

Sixty-two days after she was bred Clover went into labor. I was so scared and anxious – I thought I would throw up. My mom told me to pull myself together because my dog would feel my fear and she needed me there by her side. She started labor at 10 p.m. on Fri July 10<sup>th</sup>. The first big boy was born at 9.3 oz. He was the first and the biggest and we named him Mater. We named all of our puppies after Disney characters. Next came another boy, Zeuss; and then a girl, Maleficent.

After that Clover took a break because she was exhausted. So were we. She waited for two hours before the next baby came, another boy-Squirt. Next came a little girl – Moana and last but not least at 4:05 a.m. came Snow White. Three boys and three girls. How perfect!



How did Clover know what to do? This is her first litter and she delivered each one, cleaned each one up, and loved on them, all of that in spite of being so tired. It just amazes me that she knew what to do and the babies knew what to do too!



Clover is a perfect mommy, she just loves her new babies, wants to be with them all the time and is very, very protective of them. Even though it's a lot of work we feel so blessed to have had this experience and we would do it all again. # **Screening for Bladder Cancer**

# Why is it important?

#### Marcia Dawson, Chair STCA Health Trust Fund

The STCC has been awarded a \$2000.00 grant from the STCA's Health Trust Fund to hold a bladder screening clinic for our members, our friends, and other Scottie owners in our area. This is a great opportunity to put into action what we should all be doing with our Scotties once they reach the age of 6 years: Screen at least yearly for bladder cancer with an ultrasound exam. The earlier we can detect any abnormality in our dogs' bladders, the sooner we can get a diagnosis and start them on more effective therapy. Whichever therapy we choose, from NSAIDS or chemotherapy or alternative medicines and supportive diets, the sooner the better!

Why is this true? Why does early diagnosis translate to much more successful outcomes in our Scotties?

There is a wealth of compelling evidence that treating cancer earlier in its course is more successful than treating it when it is more advanced.

- Genetic complexity: Early stage cancer is much less genetically complex than later in its course. As a tumor grows, it changes in complexity and mutates and creates more genetic resistance to various therapies. This leads to failure of the drug. The earlier any therapy can get to a tumor, the more effective it will be.
- Immune compromise: Early in the course of cancer, the dog's immune system is stronger, and more capable of controlling runaway growth of cancer cells. Over time, as the undetected cancer grows unchecked, the immune system gets worn down and used up. This exhaustion of the immune system is a serious result of diagnosing cancer later in its course, and it robs the body of a major weapon of defense. Early detection allows us to provide essential immune support.
- Blood supply: Early in its development, a tumor is fairly well organized with structure and blood vessels that almost mimic normal cell growth. However, over time, the tumor becomes more and more abnormal with erratic behavior, runaway growth, and abnormal, gnarly blood vessels that are not able to deliver the cancer fighting drugs to the tumor. This translates again to failure of the therapy.
- General health: Early in the course of cancer, the patient, both human and dog, is stronger, healthier and better able to tolerate therapies. The quality of life is good, and starting the therapy before there are major symptoms, metastasis, and the involvement of other organs can help to prolong that quality of life.

Bladder cancer (TCC) in our Scotties is a serious health problem. We need to beat this devastating disease to the punch and detect it as early as we possibly can. Don't wait until your Scottie is straining to urinate, passing bloody urine, and acting uncomfortable. By then, it may be too late to do much good at all.

Carol Mallquest and her committee will be organizing this clinic to be held in September with more details soon to follow. Don't miss this opportunity to have your Scotties screened with a short and painless procedure, and make a New Year's resolution to have your Scotties screened starting at 6 years of age from now on!



# The Scottish Terrier Club of Chicago

The Scottish Terrier Club of Chicago was founded in 1930 by T.E. Weible and Mrs. M.F. Hills. On September 17, 1979, we were formally incorporated as a Not For Profit in the State of Illinois.

Our club is the 2nd oldest Scottish Terrier club in the nation. (California being the oldest club.) It is interesting to note that in 1959 there were still only eleven regional clubs. However, today, STCC is proud to be one of twenty Scottish Terrier regional clubs recognized by the Scottish Terrier Club of America.

STCC held its first Specialty show in November, 1930. Today, our Specialty shows are held annually the third Saturday of June at the Lake County Fairgrounds in Grayslake, IL.

Across the years our club has changed leadership and direction, as has every regional club. The allure of the Scottish Terrier has decreased, and nationally there is a strong conversation as to how to rebuild the breed, and our clubs. At our height we had 80 members. Although our membership declined, our current initiative is to expand our clubs footprint, and we are reaching out full force to add new members and, thus new energy and ideas. Today we boast 57 members and counting.

Most of our tenured members have served this club in a leadership capacity - at least once. And, there is a strong knowledge base across our club, focused on our mission. Breeders, exhibitors, and those with companion Scotties have come together with determination to improve the lives and futures of our Scotties.

In recent years, successes have been made for our breed. A test is available for Cushings Syndrome through Dr. Zimmerman and UTenn. Studies at Purdue University have increased our knowledge of bladder cancer. A home collection kit, made possible by Dr. Breen, allows owners to send in urine samples for diagnosis.
